# PASTOR GARRETT'S REPORT

In the book Simple Church, co-authors Thom Rainer and Eric Geiger recommend that churches focus on doing fewer things with greater intentionality. A simpler church, they argue with convincing data, will be a more effective church. More specifically, it will be more formative of its people, more hospitable to newcomers, and more aligned in its mission.

simpler church... will be a more effective church... it will be more formative of its people, more hospitable to newcomers, and more aligned in its mission. In 2024, we took aim at this very goal. Below are notes on how it went, along with what to look forward to in 2025.

Sunday Mornings: The church's Sunday gathering has long been called the "source and summit of the Christian life."

It is, in other words, the most important thing we do together. In 2024, we made intentional efforts to continue rooting our worship in ancient practices, convinced of their growing relevance for modern people. In a culture in which distraction and isolation are the norm, Sundays are the church's counter cultural pushback, cultivating focus (on God) and fellowship (with each other). To quote a song we sing, it is "for His glory and our good." We hope these two things – God's glory, your good – are what you experience Sunday to Sunday.

In 2024, average attendance at worship was 325 per week.

# PASTOR MATT'S REPORT

## 2024 Reflections

They say that hindsight is 20/20, but with 2024 in the rearview mirror, I would have to disagree. 2024 moved so fast, it is one big blur. I had to sit down with Sarah and ask "What happened this year!?" Granted, that may just be what happens when you parent a 2-year-old and welcome another baby into the world. However, if you take out those two factors, 2024 was still a full, fast-paced year.

There were a lot of highs and lows in 2024. As Sarah and I reflected on 2024, we described it with the phrase, "growing pains." So much good growth happened this year, yet not without some discomfort and even pain. Confirmation ministry grew, activity in denominational affiliations grew, my leadership grew, and our family grew. This year also included two first amendment auditors harass-ing Christ Lutheran, parenting a twoyear-old, and being very busy. To say 2024 was busy, is an under-statement. Most weeks, I led Sunday morning student ministries, Sunday evening high school group, Monday evening young adults, Tuesday meetings, Wednesday morning men's prayer, two sections of Wednesday evening Confirmation, and for 28% of the weeks, get ready to preach Sunday morning, and then do all this all over again. This is all on top of the different things I was involved in this year: leading 4th-6th grade retreat, leading our high school Hume Lake trip, co-leading small group leader training, beginning to organize our spiritual care ministry, and other regular pastoral duties. It has been a busy year.



Our efforts this year have yielded fruit. Three big wins in my areas of ministry are an increase in Confirmation attendance, increase in young adult engagement, and organizing Spiritual Care. Confirmation in early 2024 was on Sunday mornings and attendance would dip down to three. We switched to Wednesday evenings and offered two sections at different times. Our attendance went from an average of five to an average of 16. In early 2024 young adults met together once a month. In the fall we doubled our frequency and maintained a bi-weekly attendance of 5-12. Throughout 2024 I have been working on organizing Spiritual Care, which is a 1:1 support ministry, where Spiritual Care givers are trained to listen deeply and guide a conversation to care for someone going through some kind of stress. We currently have about eight people going to in-person training for Spiritual Care and 1-2 attending the training online.

These events are an excellent opportunity for those searching for a church home to get to know our greatest asset, our congregants.

Moreover, in 2024, we sought to promote formative prayer within the congregation's life. I encourage you to use the prayer stations at the front of the sanctuary after services. Please also lift Zoë Watts, our full-time Student Ministry Director, up in your prayers as she starts to lead our youth.

Finally, to embrace generous living, we have added Ministry Spotlights, Pastoral Letters, pastoral office hours, and Vision Summits to demonstrate your benevolent tithes in action. In 2025, I encourage you to read, attend, and participate with feedback. On a personal note, I urge you to consider attending one of our youth or adult mission trips to House of Joy in the Navajo Nation, organizing and leading a trip to Egypt to visit Fawzi House, or serving at Bridge to Home or the SCV Pregnancy Center.

Thank you for sharing this incredible journey in 2024 with the Council. I am excited to see what God has in store for us in the year ahead.
